#### **FUND OBJECTIVE**

The Growth MultiFund aims to provide high levels of growth with moderate to high levels of risk and volatility over the medium to longer-term.

It is anticipated that the Growth MultiFund will achieve a return of 3-month LIBID + 3% to 5% in the currency of the relevant share class over a rolling 5 to 7 year period.

In order to achieve the investment objective, the portfolio invests across a range of asset classes within a strategic and tactical asset allocation framework designed to maximise diversification benefits. An absolute and relative valuation-based approach underpins this framework, resulting in a multilayered process to facilitate disciplined decision-making and risk management.

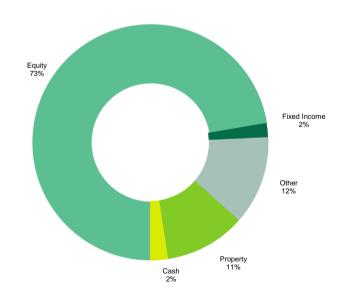

## **INVESTMENT MANAGER COMMENTARY**

# MARKET COMMENTARY Nedgroup Investments (IOM) Ltd Investment Manager and Distributor

It might seem perverse to those who do not follow financial markets closely, but sometimes bad economic news can translate into good investor returns from risk assets. As recent economic data has come through much weaker than expected, the key central banks have dramatically shifted their guidance on future monetary policy towards a much more dovish stance. The immediate impact of this change was to drive interest rate expectations and bond yields lower, but the knock-on effect has been to encourage investors to re-engage with risk assets in a renewed hunt for yield.

Although the economic outlook has clearly deteriorated, arguably the political news flow has been improving. With the UK Parliament deadlocked over Brexit, the chances of an economically damaging hard Brexit have significantly diminished, with a long extension to Article 50 or the softest of Brexit options now looking much more likely outcomes. Elsewhere, the US-China trade talks also appear to be developing well, with both sides making positive statements about progress being made.

Helped by a decline in the pound, equities advanced by +3.4% according to the MSCI AC World Index in sterling terms. All the major regions and markets posted gains, with Asia ex Japan (+3.9%) and the US (+3.9%) leading the way and Europe ex UK (+2.6%) and Japan (+2.7%) lagging. Most sectors also rose, with those that benefit from lower interest rates doing the best, and vice versa. As such, the strongest sectors were Real Estate (+7.3%), Consumer Staples (+6.2%) and Technology (+6.1%), whilst the weakest was financials (-0.3%). In terms of style, Growth (+4.5%) beat Value (+2.4%), whilst Larger Companies (+3.4%) outperformed Smaller Companies (+1.7%).

The sharp adjustment in interest rate expectations underpinned strong performance in the fixed income markets. Higher quality conventional bonds did particular well, with the JP Morgan Global Government Bond Index posting +1.8%, whilst the ICE Merrill Lynch Global Corporate Investment Grade Index did even better returning +2.1%. Other sectors made gains, with the ICE Merrill Lynch Global High Yield Index rising +0.9% and the JP Morgan Global Emerging Market Bond Index delivering +1.4% (all hedged to sterling).

The Bloomberg Commodities Index rose +1.9%, although much of the gain was driven by currency movements. At the sector level, fortunes were mixed and dispersion wide, with falling inventories pushing Crude Oil (+6.8%) higher, whilst Agriculture (-0.2%) and Gold (+0.4%) were les rewarding.

The pound generally slipped against most currencies, falling -0.4% versus the euro, -1.7% against the US dollar and -2.2% relative to the yen. However, it did make gains against some emerging market currencies, such as the Argentine peso (+8.9%), the Turkish lira (+2.4%), Brazilian real (+2.6%) and South African rand (+1.1%).

# PORTFOLIO COMMENTARY

The Nedgroup Investments Growth MultiFund increased by +1.6% during March.

Within equities, the best performing active funds were Morgan Stanley Global Brands (+5.3%) and Nedgroup Global Equity (+3.3%). Morgan Stanley Global Brands was aided by its exposure to Consumer Staples which was one of the best performing sectors, whilst Nedgroup Global Equity was assisted by good stock selection. At the other end of the spectrum, Allianz Global Small Cap Equity (+0.0%) and Dodge and Cox Global Stock (+0.3%) underperformed. Allianz was impacted by the decline in Small Caps whilst Dodge and Cox was held back by its exposure to Emerging Markets and Financial stocks, as both areas lagged the broader market.

In other asset classes, Nedgroup Global Property (+4.9%) was one of the best performing funds in the portfolio, as REITS were generally helped by falling government bond yields. Our exposure to UK commercial property exposure was more mixed. F&C Commercial Property (-2.1%) was weighed down by Brexit uncertainty, whereas the less cyclical UK Care homes, Target Healthcare (+0.0%) and Impact Healthcare (+0.9%), were positive during the month. John Laing Environmental Assets (+0.6%), 3i Infrastructure (+2.0%) and Greencoat UK Wind (+2.5%) were all positive, whilst Greencoat Renewables (-1.8%) declined. Finally, both asset-backed finance investments, SQN Asset Finance Income Fund C-Shares and GCP Asset Backed Income, returned +0.5% for the period.

We made several changes to the portfolio this month. Firstly, we established a new position in The Renewables Infrastructure Group (TRIG) via a capital raise. TRIG invests in renewables, with a particular focus on onshore wind and solar. Like our other investments in this area, we believe that TRIG will provide investors with a high level of reliable income, inflation protection, and low risk of any material loss of capital.

Secondly, we sold TOBAM Anti-Benchmark World Equity and invested the proceeds in a new holding called Fundsmith Equity. This fund should provide the portfolio with some downside protection as it looks to hold high quality business with competitive advantages that are difficult to replicate. Finally, we took the decision to sell the Vanguard Emerging Market Stock Index Fund and concentrate our emerging market equity exposure within the active equity fund TT Emerging Market Equity.
